Uniform Dress

Only school logo uniform pieces may be worn inside the classrooms; an undershirt, socks or leggings (for girls) may be worn as long as they are either black, navy, brown/tan, white or gray. Students may wear heavier jackets outside during winter season. However, the colors must adhere to our preselected uniform color scheme (solid black, navy, brown/tan, white or gray).

Shirts must be tucked in at all times. Pants and shorts must be worn at the waist. Belts are to be worn. Preferred belt colors are black, navy or brown/tan.

SAGGING IS PROHIBITED ALONG WITH FLIP FLOPS OR HOUSE SLIPPERS.

*****P.E. UNIFORMS ARE THE SAME FOR ALL STUDENTS*****

All Students must dress in appropriate P.E. Uniform

- * Navy shorts with logo, heather gray t-shirt with logo!
- * Navy blue or school issued sweatpants and sweatshirts!

GIRLS

- * Navy polo shirt, long or short sleeved with logo.
- * Khaki skirt, jumper (length a minimum of 2" below student's fingertips with arms at sides), long/short pants with black/brown/khaki belt.
- * Sweatshirt with LOGO.
- * Black, navy, brown/tan or white tennis shoes with socks, stockings or leggings. Shoe colors may be a combination of the four colors. Shoelaces need to be solid black, navy or white.
- * Belts are to be worn.
- * Optional dress shoes or flats.

DRESS UNIFORM Wednesday

- * Green plaid skirt, Khaki long pants
- * White short/long sleeved shirt w/logo—solid black, navy or green tie—Must Be Worn!
- * Navy blue cardigan, fleece or hooded jacket w/logo.
- Dress shoes—brown/tan, black or navy (heels up to 1"), dress socks, leggings or stockings.
- Seniors Only—Navy Blue Blazers with Logo.**

BOYS

- * Navy polo shirt, long or short sleeved with logo.
- ** Khaki long pants/short pants.
- * Sweatshirt w/logo, jacket with logo.
- * Black, navy, brown/tan or white tennis shoes with socks. Shoes and sock colors may be a combination of the 4 colors.
- * Shoelaces need to be black, navy or white.
- * Belts are to be worn.
- * Optional dress shoes.

- * Khaki long pants.

SPORTSMANSHIP

Good sportsmanship is when teammates, opponents, coaches, and officials treat each other with respect. Kids learn the basics of sportsmanship from the adults in their lives, especially their parents and their coaches. Kids who see adults behaving in a sportsmanlike way gradually come to understand that the real winners in sports are those who know how to persevere and to behave with dignity — whether they win or lose a game.

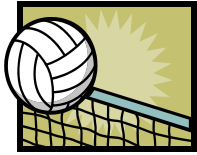
Parents can help their kids understand that good sportsmanship includes both small gestures and heroic efforts. It starts with something as simple as shaking hands with opponents before a game and includes acknowledging good plays made by others and accepting bad calls gracefully.

Kids who bully or taunt others on the playing field aren't likely to change their behavior when in the classroom or in social situations. In the same way, a child who practices good sportsmanship is likely to carry the respect and appreciation of other people into every other aspect of life.

Adults who emphasize good sportsmanship, however, see winning as just one of several goals they'd like their kids to achieve. They help young athletes take pride in their accomplishments and in their improving skills, so that the kids see themselves as winners, even if the scoreboard doesn't show the numbers going in their favor.

The best coaches — and parents — encourage their kids to play fair, to have fun, and to concentrate on helping the team while polishing their own skills.
